

The visitors were welcomed by the Chair of the City Council, Ms Mikaela Nylander, the Chair of the City Government, Mr Kaj Bärlund and the Mayor of Porvoo, Mr Jukka-Pekka Ujula.

Dinner

The Church of Finland hosted dinner for the Primates.

TUESDAY OCTOBER 13TH

The Morning Prayer was led by the Archbishop of the Evangelical-Lutheran Church of Finland.

Introductions

The Archbishop of the Evangelical-Lutheran Church of Finland welcomed the Primates to Porvoo. Porvoo is one of the nine dioceses in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Finland.

All primates briefly introduced themselves.

The Rt. Revd Ragnar Persenius was thanked by Bishop Martin Wharton for his contributions and commitment to the Porvoo Contact Group.

The Most Revd Karl Sigurbjörnsson was also introduced as the new Co-Chair of the Porvoo Contact Group.

The Rt. Revd Ragnar Persenius welcomed the two new Co-Secretaries of the Porvoo Contact Group, The Revd Dr Leslie Nathaniel and Beate Fagerli

The agenda was approved.

General Perspectives on Porvoo

The Rt. Revd Martin Wharton gave recognition to the good work done by Elspeth Davey and Steinunn A Björnsdottir as acting Co-Secretaries in the interim period.

He referred to the good work done in the Porvoo Communion. The second consultation on Diaconal Ministry in Oslo was a success. The recommendations to the churches in the consultation report need to be taken seriously by the churches. The tasks in diaconal ministry to be taken forward have been clearly documented.

The 3rd Porvoo Theological Conference took place in London in 2008, the theme being Ethics and Communion. The conference focused on the ethical dimension of being in communion. It explored how relationships can be maintained when churches diverge on ethical teaching, policy and practice. The papers presented examined the nature of the communion and its Biblical basis, recent developments and current tensions within the two communions (the Anglican Communion and the Lutheran World Federation).

The Interfaith consultation in Edinburgh in December 2008 was represented by seven of the fourteen members of the Porvoo Communion. News was shared from a number of the churches on their activities. The Porvoo Consultation on Interfaith also included people from other faiths.

Many links have been developed in this period with more interchange of people.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark plans to hold a Conference on Migration in December 2009 and there is a proposal to have a Porvoo consultation on marriage as soon as possible. The Church Leaders Consultation is to be held in Sigtuna, Sweden, in March 2010.

The Rt Revd Ragnar Persenius spoke of the 20-year Porvoo process in which the Communion was reaping the fruits of a shared life. Unity is organic – of body, soul and spirit and this will further develop.

The PCG continues to facilitate programmes on a number of issues concerning church life. It sets the agenda for the Primates meeting, the Church Leaders Consultation and the Theological Conferences.

One of the challenges facing the Porvoo Communion is to find clarity on the processes of consultation between the member churches when contentious issues are debated and decided, and when decisions taken by one church have consequences for the others.

Primates agreed that the members of the Porvoo Communion should know more about each other, look for the good of all and consultations should take into account the needs of the others. The PCG which acts on behalf of the Porvoo Communion would need to devise a framework to take the formal processes of consultation forward.

Challenges brought to the table by the Primates.

Churches need to recognise each other as they are.

The financial, political and moral crisis has resulted in distrust in society and churches, which is a challenge greater than the budget.

The financial crisis has meant that across the board cuts in public spending have been made. The assets of churches have shrunk, in some cases up to 40 % of capital value in 2008.

Churches need to intensify their work for greater peace and closer fellowship.

There needs to be openness to the different understandings of spirituality within the Porvoo Communion. Important is to take into account the developments in society and the role of the individual.

Several churches are challenged by revised structures between state and church and issues related to marriage and human sexuality continue to cause some tension in relationships.

Other issues discussed were the lack of young people in church, and the difficulties some churches are facing with regard to the consecration of women bishops.

Although the Anglican Communion continues to struggle with a diversity of challenges following the Lambeth Conference, the Communion seems to be in much better heart.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark is discussing the possibility of signing the Porvoo declaration. It would be a joy to welcome them as full members of the Porvoo Communion.

Impact of the Current Economic Situation and Climate Change

- What is our response as Christians?
- Social realities and the role of the churches.

The Rt Revd Olav Skjevesland presented a paper to the Primates on the above topic and highlighted issues of concern. The Primates along with the PCG members discussed the resulting issues in groups. Part of the task for the Porvoo churches was to be prophetic in a rapidly changing context.

The questions addressed in group were:

- How can churches take the initiative in promoting a Christian lifestyle?
- The rich and poor divide How can the church be prophetic in word and deed?

Drawing Things Together

Primates felt that business as usual was not an option. The household of God needs to clean itself. The churches need to speak forth on all issues affecting the livelihood of humanity. They need to challenge governments to implement the millennium goals. The financial crisis cannot be an excuse. Churches may not have huge financial resources, but they can speak out and be instruments of change. One of the primary concerns of the churches was the welfare of the people and not material wealth. Hypocrisy should be avoided. The task will require spiritual discipline, courage and solidarity in relationship.

Living in Communion, a good example from Finland

The Revd Dr. Tomi Karttunen presented a paper with a good example of Anglican and Lutheran cooperation in Finland. The document was distributed to all Primates. The Revd Rupert Moreton presented an example of his work among Anglican Sudanese refugees in Finland. The discussion on the topic led to the Primates considering how the Porvoo Communion can reflect more substantially on the diaspora ministry in the Porvoo context. This matter will be taken forward by the PCG.

Introduction to the Consultation on Migration in Denmark

The Revd Jan Nilsson presented a plan for a consultation on Migration taking place in Copenhagen in December 2009, and urged all members to consider sending a representative.

Living in Communion Globally

Perspectives from the Anglican Communion and the Lutheran World Federation:

Archbishop Barry Morgan spoke of recent developments in the Anglican Communion which seem to be full of uncertainties. He pointed out that only now the advantages of belonging to a communion is being realised. However, the Lambeth conference was a good one even though a number of Bishops absented themselves. The Anglican Consultative Council meeting in Jamaica in May 2009 was also a positive experience. The Anglican Communion strives to live with tensions on sexuality and authority, as indeed do other churches. It would be a mistake to think that issues of same sex blessings and the consecration of bishops in same sex relationships are merely issues facing the Epsicopal Church in America and the Canadian Church. These are issues facing other a few provinces of the Communion. At the moment the Communion has an agreement on the following:

- 1. moratorium on authorised public liturgies for same sex unions;
- 2. moratorium on the consecration of bishops living in same sex unions;
- 3. moratorium on incursions into other provinces by Primates.

The covenant process is under discussion and it remains to be seen whether this can be implemented in the wider context of the communion. There are two other processes going on in the communion:

- 1. the listening process with provinces engaging in ongoing discussions across the communion:
- 2: a hermeneutics process called the Bible and the Church today, which looks at the way the Bible is used in theological disputes.

Archbishop Anders Wejryd, Church of Sweden presented recent development in the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and pointed out that the name also includes "A Communion of Churches". The LWF wrestled for a long time with the idea of being a communion, especially since a communion would be a means of bringing smaller churches together. This is not an easy process since there are struggles on issues concerning family, marriage, sexuality and the ordination of women, which continue to be devisive, although the majority do not see them as grounds for breaking from LWF. The churches are determined to stay together in order to hear each other. The question of truth remains a hermeneutical issue which will continue to engage the LWF.

Date and venue for the next Porvoo Primates Meeting

The Archbishop of the Church in Wales has agreed to host the next Porvoo Primates Meeting from 3-7 October, 2011 in Wales.

Closing Eucharist

The closing evening Eucharist was held at the Porvoo Cathedral. Regular church member including the Cathedral choir were present. The Bishop of Porvoo presided and the Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church preached.

The Porvoo Primates Meeting ended with a splendid reception hosted by the Bishop of Porvoo.

	The report was received. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark (ELCD) is working towards signing the Porvoo Declaration. This news was warmly received by the PCG. One of the points discussed was in connection with the ordination of priests by deans. 14 pastors have been ordained by Cathedral deans on the authority of the bishops. However, ELCD emphasises that this was not the normal practice.

The question was raised as to why there seems to be still some hesitation in certain constituencies in the CofE on the matter. It was, however, noted that the process cannot be stopped and that there is no doubt that there will be women bishops in the CofE.	Await developments
	Estonia A written report was available. The report was received.	
	Finland The report was received. A discussion took place on the mutual recognition between the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Finland and the Methodists in Finland. The Church of Finland clarifies that	

the Methodists in Finland are members of the United Methodist Church and are therefore Episcopal.

Iceland

The report was received. Iceland has been strongly affected by the financial crisis, which has also affected the church. However, it was underlined that positive energy had emerged in spite of the crisis. There had been a change in attitudes with a broader focus on life and non-material values. Although the church is suffering financially, the previous year had been the best year in terms of contributions from members.

Ireland

The report was received.

Latvia

The report was received. There has been some insecurity as to further participation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia in the Porvoo Communion. The Latvian bishops continue to discuss the issue. Members of the Porvoo Communion continue to hope that the ELCL will become a member.

On the other hand there are indications that the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia (in Exile) would be willing to sign the Porvoo declaration. It is understandable that they would like to be part of the Porvoo Communion. The 'exile church' established a church of their own in Riga with a pastor, who spends half his time in Riga and the other half in Germany. There is an Archbishop in Germany who is responsible for the 'exile church', and there has been some co-operation with the regular ELCL archbishop and the 'ELCL in Exile' on some matters. For example, with regard to the use of space.

Estonian and Lithuanian exile churches merged with their mother churches. However, this is not the case in Latvia. The 'exile church' does not wish to become part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia. It intends to follow the Lutheran World Federation line. The regular ELCL, however, does not wish to take the LWF approach on the ordination of women for priesthood, episcopate and the on the issue of homosexuality.

It was clarified that the PCG had not wished to put a deadline for the regular ELCL to take a decision regards signing the Porvoo Declaration.

It may be useful to organise a conference in Latvia in order to create some momentum forward.

Lithunia

The report was received. There are 14 congregations in Belarus which have historically belonged to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Lithuania. Bishop Mindaugas Sabutis ordains priests and deacons for service in the Lutheran congregations in Belarus.

Norway

The report was received. The election of Olav Fykse Tveit as general secretary of the WCC was noted. It was agreed that the PCG send its greetings and congratulations.

Co-Secretaries

Portugal

The report was received. A declaration on mutual recognition of baptism has been signed by the Lusitanian Church, the Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church (forming the Ecumenical Council) and the Roman Catholic Church.

Scotland

The report was received. The "Statement of Partnership" conversations are being opened up for participation by a wider group of churches. On September 20, 2008 church members were encouraged to bring a friend to church. This has led to an increase in Sunday service attendance in some of the parishes.

Spain

The report was received. The Episcopal Reformed Church in Spain was formed by the Spanish for the Spanish people. It is an extra provincial diocese in the Anglican Communion. Its Metropolitan is the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Church has 20 – 25 congregations in six cities with a total of approximately 5000 members. The membership is, however, not very active.

A religious liberty law with a wider, secular perspective is currently being discussed in Spain. There will be a number of legal issues which will cause concern, not least for the Protestant churches in Spain.

Sweden

The report was received. As a result of the financial crisis, Sweden is currently facing the highest rate of unemployed young people in Europe.

The Mission Covenant Church of Sweden, the Methodist Church in Sweden (UMC) and the Baptist church in Sweden are moving towards union. All these churches wish to maintain closer relations with the Church of Sweden.

Translations of objections to the doctrinal commission's statement on marriage would be made. The statement produced by committee of the General Synod will be translated and will include the statement of the doctrinal commission, the synodical committee as well as the objections.

The report was received.

At the outset it was pointed out that the PCG cannot be used as a vehicle for other interests. However, the idea behind this particular consultation arose as a result of the Edinburgh consultation. Furthermore, it has received the support of the Bishop of Gothenburg. It has been made clear to the initiators that such a consultation would be a Porvoo Communion contribution. The following are some of the issues which need further consideration: Is this to be a consultation between Christians and Muslims only? If it is to relate to our particular contexts, it may be natural to restrict it to Christian – Muslim dialogue The Porvoo Communion should use the opportunity to produce a suitable and practical interfaith theological document along with suitable guidelines for use The financial situation needs clarification. It would be good to establish at the outset the financial contributions possible from the Diocese of Gothenburg and the Church of Sweden There should be one or two representatives from each church at the consultation Dates: 28 th to 31 st March 2011 or 4 th to 7 th April 2011	Planning group: Christopher Meakin, Elspeth Davey and the Co- Secretaries with Christopher and Elspeth being the lead persons.

influence the resources channelled to CEC.

3. Relations to the Community of Protestant Churches in Europe (CPCE)

A consultation in Copenhagen in May 2010 will bring together the Nordic, Baltic and Anglican churches to work on regional cooperation. Most of the Porvoo Communion is not interested in strengthening the structural part of the Leueneberg fellowship, but rather to keep the current co-operation going. Current work:

- A CPCE and Baptist church dialogue is underway with alter and pulpit fellowship. It is hoped that this will not affect the dialogue with the Orthodox churches in Europe.
- A paper from the working group on Scripture, Confession and Church will soon be sent to the member churches for comments.
- A paper from the working group on Ordination, Ministry and Episcopé will also be sent to members churches for comments.
- A new working group on "Ecclesia Semper Reformanda" will begin its work this autumn.

4. Porvoo Extension

It was noted that Kaisa Hintikka would deliver a paper on the situation of the Lutheran Church of Ingria and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Russia and Other States (ELCROS). This would provide the PCG with relevant material, greater insight and help in future developments.

Tomi Karttunen to follow up

There is need to develop a process on how to take forward requests from churches seeking membership in the Porvoo Communion. There are indications that the following churches are interested in membership:

Co-Secretaries to work on a draft proposal for PCG consideration

- The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Lithuania and its relations to the Belarus congregations
- The Lutheran Church in Poland
- The Lutheran Church in Great Britain
- The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia in Exile
- The Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Faro Islands
- The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Greenland. This would be the consequence of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark's signing the Porvoo Agreement

Some of these churches have been part of the Porvoo process, others are new the agreement. This aspect would need to be taken into account when processes for entering the communion are being put in place.

5. Porvoo Hymnal

Each member will need to check the list of hymns as well as problems related to copyright. Publishing options have been checked with the Anders Frostenson foundation. Publishing in pdf is not advisable.

It would be helpful if there is an order for 5000 copies. If 10 churches were to order 500 copies each, it would cost each church 2000 €.

The idea of a Porvoo Hymnal would provide the churches with a Porvoo identity. It would appeal to a number of groups within the churches and could become widely used. Finland strongly supports this venture. The Diocese in Europe representative sees interesting opportunities for its use.

The PCG can commit itself to only about Euros 10000.

5000 copies may not be needed.

Christopher will look into the possibilities of taking this forward.

6. Clergy Exchange

Churches need to inform one another of clergy from partner churches working in one of their churches. Elspeth Davey and Christopher Meakin will draw up a simple step-by-step process of what needs to be done to map/follow up the stories of such clergy.

7. Patterns of ordained ministry

The pattern of ordained ministry is changing rapidly. On the one hand there are many retired priests. On the other hand the number of active priests is decreasing. The nature of ordained ministry has also become collaborative with team effort playing a more central role. Those in ordained leadership are moving towards becoming facilitators, overseers and energisers of a whole team of people. Clergy are not necessarily trained for this.

8. WCC

Christopher Meakin gave a short report of the Faith and Order Plenary Commission meeting he had attended. The following points were noted:

- Ecclesiological processes are being discussed
- Moral discernment of the churches was a point of discussion. Churches were looking at patterns and methods in responding to ethical issues.

The work of the WCC is based on consensus. This has been successful, but can delay processes. However, it was emphasised that consensus decisions are owned by all.

9. Ecumenical Kirchentag

The Ecumenical Kirchentag is to be held in Münich from 11th to 16th May 2010. To explore whether a Porvoo Communion meeting could be organised.

Also to be noted are the 'Finnish Church Days', which are similar to the Kirchentag and happen bi-annually.

- Furthermore, a consultation should ensure that honest conversations happen.
- No church has all the wisdom or all the moral high ground.
- Marriage has both a natural and legal place within society.
 Churches need to explore how they relate to this fact.
 Furthermore civil marriage legislation brings forth different reactions from different churches. All churches are affected by such legislation. A marriage consultation should not dilute all the common ground so far achieved in the Porvoo Communion.
- One possibility is to look at the Church of Sweden as a case study, and among other things, how this church has been put under pressure by the State.
- The Church of Sweden has been keeping the Churches in the Porvoo Communion informed of changes in marriage legislation in Sweden and the possible responses of the Church of Sweden. It feels that it has been honest in this connection and calls for honest moral discernment within all the churches of the Porvoo Communion.

At the end of the debate there was consensus that the churches in the Porvoo Communion needed each other and needed to be in solidarity with one another. A marriage consultation would indeed generate better understanding of the particular situation faced by all churches in their different contexts. It would deepen knowledge and sharing and present to the world a Communion which can address important issues, and despite holding different positions on specific issues, could still see the enormous common ground achieved as key to remaining together.

The Church of Finland has agreed to host the consultation at the latest in the autumn of 2011.

The PCG approved a planning committee of: Christopher Meakin (Sweden), Tomi Karttunen (Finland), Leslie Nathaniel (England) and Beate Fagerli (Norway).

Consultation on Diaspora

The idea to work towards a consultation on diaspora communities emerged from the Primates meeting, which engaged on the issue of 'living in communion locally'. The PCG members recognised that this suggestion needed to be given serious consideration.
